4-Year-Old Vision Screening Thursday 20th July and Wednesday 26th July

We will be having a nurse from Central Coast Local Health District coming out to the centre to screen all 4-year-olds as well as any 5 year olds who were missed last year. This is a free service funded by the NSW Government and is essential for all children who are 4 and 5.

Consent packs were sent home last month. They need to be completed and returned to the centre. If Wednesday or Thursday is not your child's day, we encourage you to bring your child into the centre from 11.15am - 12.30pm. Each screening takes approximately 10 minutes. Please email with your preferred booking time and I will confirm if the time is available. Alternatively, if these days don't suit you are welcome to book an appointment at the Child and Family Health Clinic in Gosford. If you would like to book an extra day for your child to attend on these days, please see myself or Erin to check availability.

LEARNING THROUGH PLAY

As part of following our Early Years Learning Framework we provide a play-based curriculum for all children. Our Philosophy states that we believe that all children learn through play.

So how do children learn through play? What exactly is play based learning?

Play based learning provides opportunities for children to learn as they discover, create, improvise, and imagine.

Play is an important part of a child's early development. Playing helps young brains to develop and for their language and communication skills to mature.

'The role of play has an important impact on children's learning and development. Play is integral to children's development of language skills, social skills, intellectual and emotional intelligence.

Adult's role in play is also important, providing resources and support.'

Play based learning capitalises on children's natural inclination to be curious, explore and learn.





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News from our Educational Leader Kathy (cont.) ..



One of the essential benefits of play-based learning is that it helps children develop cognitively. Through play, children can explore, experiment, and discover. This hands-on learning allows them to understand concepts and build critical thinking skills. Play also helps children practice problem-solving.

Unstructured free play is the best type of play for young children. It isn't planned. It lets children use their

imagination and move at their own pace.

What is an example of learning through play in childcare?

Playing games like dress-up, make-believe, and hide and seek engages your child's imagination and creativity, as well as social skills when engaged in play with others. Playing with sensory materials like playdough can develop your child's fine motor skills and creativity. Constructing activities provide opportunities for trial and error, problem solving skills, math concepts, and again creativity. Engaging in arts and crafts promotes creativity and the ability to express ideas and make meaning as they use a range of media.

Any play experiences provide so many wonderful developmental opportunities for learning!

So when you see your children engaged in play, they are not just 'having fun' but developing so many skills that assist them with their growth and development.

Welcome to July.

We have enjoyed a relaxed school holiday period where we all enjoyed wearing our pyjamas for Pyjamas week. This is a wonderful week where everyone gets to relax and be comfy in their pyjamas, and enjoy a short period of watching a movie whilst eating popcorn. Needless to say the children love it, and so do the Educators!



During the month we also celebrated Naidoc Week, which is a week dedicated to celebrating the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. Through celebrating this we can help the children develop a deeper understanding of Aboriginal culture.

Throughout the week we enjoyed reading and discussing special dreamtime stories. We set up an indigenous discovery area for the children to explore. It included aboriginal

books, puzzles, tapping sticks, flags and special sand trays for the children to draw aboriginal symbols in with sticks. The children created aboriginal flag handprints to add to the area and we discussed what the colours on the flag meant. They also helped to paint a mural that contained aboriginal flag handprints as well as





Aboriginal symbols. We incorporated some dot painting craft, and even participated in games of Aboriginal symbol bingo. This group game provided a wonderful opportunity to explore the many different symbols that the Aboriginal people used in their storytelling. We added a variety of natural items to our natural playdough to inspire traditional creativity with their sensory

experience.

We also introduced a traditional Indigenous song called 'Taba Naba'



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that originated from the Torres Strait Islands. This is sung in the local language of its origin and it describes the everyday activity of going out to the reef to fish.

As an embedded practice we do our Acknowledgement of Country each day. We gather the children using our wooden tapping sticks and sit together under the tree in our yarning circle. We touch the earth and look at the sky as we say our Acknowledgement together.

All these experiences promote respect for cultural Diversity as we explore the Indigenous culture, traditions and history.



The children have been very Interested in dinosaurs lately – often digging up 'dinosaur fossils' in our yard. So, we packed away our fairy area and turned it into a fabulous Jurassic world discovery area. There are many different types of dinosaurs to explore! We all helped to paint our Dinosaur



cave, complete with cave paintings! We also have dinosaur fossil excavations happening!

We incorporate the creative arts into our interest centre by presenting a variety of dinosaur craft experiences that extend on fine motor, scissor and creative skills.

Literacy is also promoted through providing many different dinosaur books - both fiction and non-fiction. This led to exploring some real fossils, which were fascinating to investigate.

Due to an overwhelming interest in presenting news, we introduced book news bags. The children contribute to News time so enthusiastically, which promotes self-esteem, confidence, and communication skills. The listeners develop respectful listening, attention span and ability to ask relevant questions.

Changes to Child Care Subsidy

From 10 July 2023, there are changes to the way Services Australia work out your Child Care Subsidy (CCS) entitlement. Child care will be cheaper for most families.

Statements

Statements are sent out weekly on Wednesdays. Please check your statements closely - on page 3 or 4 under "Account Transactions" of your statement you will find the future payment to be deducted with "Fee Payment by Batch DD/ CC" in bold and the date and amount next to it. If there is ever a problem with the date or amount to be deducted and you need to change this, please contact us as soon as possible to avoid a dishonour fee of \$19.95 (this is charged by Debitsuccess who handles the payments for us and beyond our control). If you need to make any changes to your payment date or amount, please let us know with a minimum of 48 hours' notice to amend a payment as they are locked in by Debitsuccess after.



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News from the Office (cont.) ...

We have had a few families querying why their CCS % rebate has changed lately, unfortunately this is out of our control, and if you have any queries, you will need to call Centrelink directly, or log on to your MyGov account. There can be a number of reasons why your CCS can change including a parent returning to work, an older child turning six, you may have lodged your Tax Return and your family's income may have changed, you may have an outstanding debt with Centrelink that they are recovering through charging you higher fees (Centrelink's Debt Recovery Line is 1800 076 072).

I am always here to discuss your account with you if you have any concerns.

Immunisations

Thank you to everyone who has recently sent through their children's updated immunisation history statements. Updated immunisation history statements can be downloaded from your Medicare services within your myGov account. Please ensure that you email us an updated copy after each immunisation as we are legally required to keep them in your child's file.

Excursion Permission Forms

Thank you to everyone who has filled out the emailed Google Form Excursion Permission Form. Last week I have re-emailed and also printed off a copy for any families that still need to return the form for their children, could you please either fill out the emailed copy or the paper form and return it to me at your earliest convenience.
